


Annual report 2024


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Organization chart

Presenting CPE



In many countries, sexual violence is still used to humiliate, instill terror, and destroy communities. It has long-lasting consequences and remains largely unpunished.

The alarming rise in cases of sexual violence committed against children, denounced by the UN and by Dr. Mukwege (gynecologist and Nobel Peace Prize Laureate in 2018), prompted Véronique De Keyser, Cathleen de Kerchove, Isabelle Durant, and Marie-Dominique Simonet to create the NGO The Children of Panzi and Elsewhere (CPE) in 2015.

CPE cares for traumatized children in conflict and post-conflict zones, with a particular focus on minors who are victims of and/or born of sexual violence.

CPE has developed a holistic psychosocial care methodology for children over a three-year period, in partnership with the University of Liège.


This methodology is continuously taught to local teams of psychologists and psychosocial assistants and is also the subject of training for other international organizations.

The local team supports young victims of severe violence using individual therapy, family therapy, and group therapy.

CPE also provides educational support to children and assists families. This comprehensive care is complemented by prevention and awareness campaigns on current issues, aimed at all members of the community.







Transition to annual follow-up

in Bunyakiri and in Kavumu



After three years of sustained support in Bunyakiri and Kavumu, 2024 marks the transition to annual monitoring with needs assessment in these two communities.

Our efforts have borne fruit. Children born of sexual violence have strengthened their personal skills and their ability to envision a positive future. Through activities focused on creativity, autonomy, and teamwork, they have discovered their talents and acquired the tools necessary to build a better future.

The results are encouraging. All the set objectives have been achieved, with significant progress for each child. The families, too, have been prepared for sustainable autonomy through mutual aid initiatives, awareness campaigns, and strengthened community support.

Although our regular presence is coming to an end, the monitoring continues. We will adopt a less frequent intervention schedule to assess progress and provide support if needed. This transition ensures continuity in support while empowering the communities in the long term.

Thanks to this approach, we are leaving behind solid foundations and a wave of hope for the children and their families.

Nyota Center

Vocational training



2024 marked the completion of our two projects focused on income-generating activities (IGAs), in partnership with Wallonie Bruxelles International (WBI).


The first project focused on funding vocational training for vulnerable young girls welcomed at the Nyota Center, thus providing them with new employment opportunities and the means to realize their dreams!

Beyond their socio-economic integration, this program also aimed at their psychological restoration, in line with the mission of the Children of Panzi and Elsewhere (CPE). By reducing the impact of the trauma they experienced and strengthening their resilience, it allowed them to acquire essential professional skills.

The central objective was therefore their personal development, psychological reconstruction, and the learning of strategies necessary for managing viable and sustainable income-generating activities, in order to ensure their autonomy and financial independence.

Nyota Center

Vocational training



- 65 girls were trained on the selection and management of successful incomegenerating activities.
- 2 girls were enrolled at the Higher Pedagogical Institute of Bukavu in Computer Science and Management and in Accounting and Administrative Management.
- 11 young girls were able to enroll in training for mixed hairstyling and beauty professions and received a set of tools for their professional reintegration.
- Materials were provided to support the handmade soap production unit to teach the girls the craft of soap-making for their financial empowerment.
- 3 maize processing machines for Tuska production, along with the necessary ingredients, were provided to the girls to support their income-generating activity (IGA) in agro-food production.
- 20 new laptops and a printer-copier were provided to introduce the girls to the use of computers and their application in the professional environment.

Bakery

Income-generating activities



The second project carried out in partnership with WBI, aimed at promoting female entrepreneurship in Bukavu, which was launched this year, concerns the survivors of Maison Dorcas. This second initiative focused on implementing a bakery managed and maintained by and for women, with the goal of empowering them and providing a stable source of income.

Integrated into the pastry training program of the Panzi Foundation, this bakery allowed the survivors to learn how to produce bread, pastries, and other baked goods. This project not only provided them with skills in team management and customer service but also offered them practical experience in the field.

The bakery also served to raise awareness in the local community about sexual violence and the need to support survivors in their reintegration process. Thanks to the tuk-tuk used for deliveries, which displayed visible prevention messages, the bakery became a tool for mobilization and awareness.

By offering a profitable and sustainable professional activity, this initiative not only allowed the beneficiaries to access vocational training but also helped them develop skills and create new prospects for the future.

Community library

Access to books and games for all



In 2024, we also inaugurated a community library and playroom, funded by the United Nations Women's Guild (UNWG). These facilities were designed to support children in reducing the impact of the trauma they have suffered and to strengthen their resilience through the benefits of play and reading.

The project, integrated into the Nyota Center, primarily targets young girls in difficult situations. It is part of the mission of the Children of Panzi and Elsewhere (CPE), focusing on their psychological restoration, well-being, and overall development.

The library provides a space for learning and discovery through books, while the playroom allows young girls to engage in various indoor and outdoor games, as well as creative activities.

These facilities play a key role in their rehabilitation. They promote empowerment, harmonious development, and psychological rebuilding, while opening up perspectives for their future.

Prevention and awareness



The Children of Panzi and Elsewhere (CPE) adopts a unique model combining an integrative and innovative approach, collective work aimed at restoring social ties and strengthening communities, as well as a long-term vision in line with children's rights and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

To support these initiatives, CPE's teams developed this year a series of prevention and awareness video clips addressed to a broad audience, covering the following topics:

- Video 1: Quality Education for All
- Video 2: Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment
- Video 3: Justice and Conflict Resolution
- Video 4: Birth Registration of Children
- Video 5: Reducing Inequalities
- Video 6: Psychosomatic Disorders

The production of these video clips aligns with SDGs 3 (Health and Well-being), 4 (Quality Education), 5 (Gender Equality), and 16 (Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions).

We are convinced that an informed community is better equipped to detect and report abuse, thereby ensuring the protection of the most vulnerable.

Scientific conferences

Research and progress





April 2024

CPE was invited to speak at the conference on the mental health of victims of conflict-related violence held in Kinshasa, DRC.

This conference was organized by the National Fund for Reparations of Victims of Sexual Violence Related to Conflict and Victims of Crimes Against Peace and Security of Humanity (FONAREV), in collaboration with the National Mental Health Program of the Ministry of Public Health, FRACARITA, and Swiss Cooperation.

During this conference, we presented the mission of our NGO and contributed to highlighting best practices for supporting young victims of sexual violence, as well as for establishing appropriate reparation mechanisms.

June 2024

CPE participated in the 4th Congress of the Mukwege International Chair.

During this Congress, organized by the University of Angers, we presented our methodology and approach in the care of child victims of sexual violence in Kavumu.

Finally, the members of the Scientific Committee of the Chair, including our President, met to discuss future research perspectives on gender-based sexual violence.

Scientific conferences

Research and progress





October 2024

CPE traveled to New York (USA) to present its actions to the United Nations (UN). The President of the association was invited by Pramila Patten, UN Special Representative on Sexual Violence in Conflict, on the occasion of the 15th anniversary of her mandate.

This event aimed to provide a platform for exchange on research and progress in psychosocial support and mental health care programs, following a survivor-centered approach. CPE highlighted the challenges faced on the ground, shared best practices, and presented the lessons learned from its experience.

December 2024

CPE participated in the 5th Congress of the Mukwege International Chair, organized in Montreal (Canada). This major event brought together international experts in health, research, social action, politics, and law to exchange best practices for combating gender-based violence and promoting women's empowerment in line with the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals.

During this congress, we presented our video clips created as part of our prevention and awareness campaigns, highlighting our commitment to sustainable change.

Training courses

Psychological trauma in children



In 2024, CPE developed its training program on the theme of child psychotrauma. This year, CPE Belgium teams travelled to Iraq and the Democratic Republic of Congo, to train field workers in the psychosocial care of child victims of sexual violence, born of rape, and child soldiers.

The modules provided to these teams included:

- Child development and psychotrauma
- Parenting and attachment
- Brain neurobiology and traumatic memory
- Emotion regulation and the tolerance window
- Aggression and addictions in children
- The child in legal proceedings
- Therapeutic approaches and scientific foundations
- Introducing Kooki (application and coloring book)
- ...

At the request of our teams, we are preparing new modules to continue our training courses in 2025, aimed at a wide range of audiences.

Missions

In the DRC and Iraq

In March, Cathleen and Laura flew to Iraqi Kurdistan to train teams from the Free Yezidi Foundation (FYF).

The theme of this training course for psychosocial workers (Harikaras) was "Psychosocial support for traumatized children in conflict zones".

Our program, specially designed to meet the needs of the field, covered key themes such as aggression management, addictions, suicide, as well as support for children who have survived after being abducted by Daesh.

In November, the CPE team travelled to Bukavu (DRC) to conduct the latest training module in collaboration with WAPA and Médecins du Monde. This latest learning cycle focused on therapeutic management of traumatized children its scientific foundations.

During this mission, we also supervised the setting up of the community library, the running of professional training courses and the implementation of Income-Generating Activities (IGA) at the Nyota Center and Maison Dorcas.

The CPE Belgium team organized 3 training missions this year. The aim of each visit was to build the capacity of local teams, meet our partners in the field and supervise ongoing activities.





In April, Cathleen and Laura travelled to Bukavu (DRC) to run a training course for psychologists and psychosocial assistants from various organizations, as part of our partnership with WAPA.

The training brought together teams from BVES, Médecins du Monde, Maison Dorcas, the Panzi Hospital and Foundation, and was marked by dynamic exchanges and the sharing of experiences.

The involvement and enthusiasm of all participants contributed greatly to the success of the training.

In addition to acquiring knowledge, we were keen to promote networking between these organizations, sharing common themes and proposing complementary interventions, in order to encourage collaboration.

Academic collaborations

On sexual violence



One of CPE's missions is to pass on knowledge about sexual violence in the context of conflict, and to raise awareness of the consequences of childhood psychotrauma. To achieve this goal, our association works closely with several universities, both in Belgium and abroad, to build the capacity of mental health professionals.

As part of these partnerships, CPE was invited to speak at a course organized in Bukavu (DRC) by the Center for Humanitarian Studies at the University of Geneva. The theme of the course was "Preventing and responding to sexual violence in conflict and emergency situations". This collaboration continued in September with the launch of a pilot module on "Responding to the needs of children born of sexual violence in conflict zones".

CPE is also pursuing its long-standing partnership with the University of Liège. Together, we produced a research report commissioned by the Sexual Violence Care Centers (Centres de Prise en Charge des Violences Sexuelles - CPVS) and the Institute for the Equality of Women and Men in Belgium. The study focused on best practice in therapeutic support for under-age victims during the first six months following the occurrence of sexual violence.

In conflict and post-conflict zones, young people are a driving force for lasting and significant change, in order to build a future of hope, peace and prosperity for all.


In the face of global socio-economic, political and ecological challenges, young people represent an immense potential for the future.
